COUNCIL WORKSHOP MEETING MINUTES
July 18, 2017

The Council Workshop Meeting of the Municipality of Norristown was called to order by Council President, Sonya Sanders, at 6:30 PM in the Council Chambers.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Meeting Minutes from 07-05-2017

There was a motion by Olivia Brady with a second by Heather Lewis to Motion to approve the Minutes from the July 5, 2017 Council Meeting.. A Roll Call Vote resulted in:

EXECUTIVE SESSION ANNOUCEMENT

Council President Sanders announced that Council met in Executive Session prior to tonight's meeting to discuss litigation issues.

PRESENTATIONS:

Elmwood Park Zoo Activity Update

Representatives from Elmwood Park Zoo will be presenting Council with an update on the Zoo's activities and future plans

Mr. Al Zone, Executive Director of the Elmwood Park Zoo in Norristown, presented an update on activities and goals for the Zoo.

Mr. Zone started the presentation by providing information regarding grant writing that would allow the Zoo to provide certain programs such as the "Job Initiative Program" so kids can receive job training and give the Zoo an opportunity to work with local school kids.

Mr. Stan Huskey, VP of Public Affairs at the Zoo, handed out overview of some of the kid programs being offered and provided a handout highlighting some of the local businesses that the Zoo deals with. Mr. Huskey also mentioned the fundraising efforts the Zoo has been involved with for the Norristown Police and Fire Departments.

Mr. Al Zone noted that the Zoo is on target for 600,000 visitors this year. He noted that since the Zoo's Curator's passing, they were able to hire the best Animal Behaviorist from the Philadelphia Zoo. He added that the Zoo Membership is up 30% this year.

Marty Houstus, an engineer working with the Zoo, is overseeing the design for a potential new parking lot proposed by the Zoo on an adjacent property. Mr. Houstus noted where the Zoo would like to install a parking lot, where to intend to put facilities and highlighted current parking areas, including employee parking and parking for the general public. Mr. Houstus added that the Zoo proposes the construction of an asphalt walkway with lighting to the main entrance and the installation of Handicapped Parking to be more in compliance with regulations. Mr. Houstus also provided information regarding landscaping islands, canopy and screening trees, and stormwater management facilities.

Mr. Zone noted that the parking lot design is Phase I, which is fully funded as well as replacing the Open Space Funding for ball fields. He noted that Phase 2 is for additional parking.

Code Enforcement Performance Review

Norristown Code Manager Michael Simonson will be presenting Council with a three (3) year statistical performance of Norristown Code Enforcement.

Code Manager, Michael Simonson, conducted a Power Point Presentation highlighting the 3-year performance review of the Code Enforcement Department.

After providing a brief summary of housing demographics in Norristown, including figures such as there are 14,441 total housing units in Norristown with 61% consisting of rental properties, Mr. Simonson described some of the changes made to the department since he became Code Manager in June 2015.

Other highlights included: 37% increase in rental inspections (2016 vs. 2017), a 31% increase in owner-occupied inspections (2016 vs. 2017), double digit percentage increases in permits issued as well as identified violations since 2015.

There were further details such as daily activities of the department, number of inspectors, changes in procedures resulting in less down time, cross training inspectors, outreach programs to inform the public what the Code Department does, , addition of more work shifts to be more aware of issues, third party partnerships, working with the bank more closely regarding vacant properties, Work Camp program, more liens, owner-occupied transfers.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Jim Watters, West Norriton Twp. Resident

Mr. Watters commented that the Riverfront Park event was "fantastic" which he captured on video and will put on You Tube. He noted his music group on the River will be presenting a video, a 3-part series ("Dragon Boat - Before and Now.") He noted he will be writing a letter to the President of the Watershed Foundation and possibly working with the water company for ideas on creating more community involvement with the river. He added that the Dragon Boat Club would like to bring the National Championship event here. Mr. Watters will be helping with the harvester machine to rip up weeds in order to clear channels to be sure it is safe.

Buck Jones, 1321 Pine Street, Norristown

He asked that Council speak up about the recent shootings and to tell people that Council is working on it. Council engaged in a conversation with Mr. Jones regarding this.

Mr. Jones also commented about the 10 foot fence at the Oak Street Park. He noted the job wasn't finished and it is posing danger.

ITEMS FOR ACTION:

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATOR:

Keep America Beautiful Affiliation

Motion for Council to authorize staff to initiate the application process to make Norristown an official affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, a national non-profit dedicated to inspiring and educating people to take action to improve and beautify their community and environment.

Municipal Administrator Crandall Jones provided a history of Norristown's interest in affiliation with Keep America Beautiful: Council started a process of an Environmental Advisory Board, on which Councilwoman Brady took the lead. There weren't enough sign-ups so they had to pursue another approach.

This approach would have Council appoint Mr. Jones' Assistant, Brandon Ford, as the Executive Director of the Norristown Affiliate. Twelve (12) representatives from the community would be invited to serve on an advisory board to offer their feedback and suggestions as well as assist Mr. Ford in the operations of the Affiliate.

The Affiliation would be funded by recycling reward funds the Municipality would receive approximately \$18,000 a year from the municipal trash hauler JP Mascaro.

The Advisory Board would meet 3-4 times per year and work with the citizens, corporate reps, etc. The New Horizons Collaborative's volunteers could recruit other volunteers.

Mr. Jones noted that Council, as an affiliate, could receive technical materials, access to grants, etc. to start a cleanliness program in Norristown.

He noted he would need Council's authorization to proceed. He noted that the cost of training would be \$3000 and letters would be sent out asking to be a part of the Advisory Board.

There was a motion by Valerie Scott-Cooper with a second by Heather Lewis to Motion to authorize the "Keep America Beautiful" affiliation.. A Roll Call Vote resulted in:

Regulating Food Trucks in the Municipality

Council will discuss the Municipality's policy on food trucks and potential new regulations on how they operate in Norristown.

Mr. Crandall Jones noted to Council that staff would like to request a discussion about food trucks in the Municipality and to get guidance from Council as to the direction in how they would like staff to proceed with dealing with the issue.

Mr. Jones noted that Ordinance 09-08, which restricts the operation of food trucks in Norristown, is not a detailed document and suggested a wholesale revamping of the Ordinance and establish a clear and detailed process of overseeing food truck operations in the Municipality. He noted it would involve staff time and the proposed changes would need to cover things regarding the application, requirements and liability coverage.

Mr. Jones asked Council to motion staff to proceed with drafting a new policy.

Councilwoman Gardiner agreed it was a great idea and suggested limiting to the Main Street area for special events.

Councilwoman Brady suggested an annual registration because there should be some way for an organization to have a new kind of food truck or as part of an event. She noted there should be flexibility.

Councilwoman Scott-Cooper noted food trucks are "trending up." She suggested also looking at the Riverfront, the ball fields and the parks.

Council Perry suggested looking to see who has Food Truck Ordinances and read them.

Solicitor Kilkenny suggested that Staff, the Police, Finance, Fire, etc. decide on the hours and the region and encouraging it.

There was a motion by Suanne Gardiner with a second by Heather Lewis to Regulating Food Trucks in the Municipality.. A Roll Call Vote resulted in:

CODE ENFORCEMENT:

Advertisement of Ordinance 17-10: Swimming Pool Regulations

Motion to advertise Ordinance 17-10 which amends Chapter 286 regarding the requirements for the installation and maintenance of swimming pools.

Code Enforcement Manager, Michael Simonson, noted there is conflicting information in the General Code Chapter 286 regarding the maintenance and installation of swimming pools so he is asking Council to approve the advertisement of the replacement with the current language.

There was a motion by Valerie Scott-Cooper with a second by Olivia Brady to Motion to approve/disapprove the advertisement of Ordinance 17-10 - Swimming Pool Regulations.. A Roll Call Vote resulted in:

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS:

Police Report

Chief Talbot stated, with regard to recent shootings, that "There is nothing wrong with Norristown." He noted that we tend to look at violence as a reflection of the community.

He noted that a small percentage of the residents are involved in violence.

He stated that about 90% of people who get shot are involved in criminal activity. He provided details about the recent shootings:

The shooting in February was a group of construction workers.

Homicide in April - shooting - engaged in criminal activity.

May - oldest motive for shooting - a violent relationship.

June - shootings. Didn't want to tell story.

July -16-year old Jordan Scott shooting. Predictable. Engaged in criminal activity.

July - man from Philadelphia lost his life - also engaged in criminal activities.

July - dispute among neighbors. Chief noted "We have to deal with a small amount of people doing bad things."

Chief noted that the Police partnered with agencies to come up with a strategy - Extra patrols. Command ranked person on duty. Manage big investigations. Monthly violent crime meeting. Started street mobilizations. Command walks. Entire command staff going to hot spots. Get people to speak directly. Focus on the people who are using guns and those who choose not to talk about people they know who carry guns. Make sure we are spending time with the small group.

Councilman Perry noted, "We have the best Police Chief in PA."

Fire Report

Chief O'Donnell provided details of his monthly report:

Hosted a Joint Fire prevention education, attended a Coordination meeting for the Lafayette Street gas line replacement project, canvassed Dekalb Street from Elm Street to East Johnson Highway, installing smoke detectors.

Attended the PAL Youth Rally, hosted "Safety and Survival Training," attended the HUB meeting, in-service training with University of Penn, hosted ATV Safety Class.

YTD - 553 emergency calls, average response time 4 minutes, 25 seconds, property loss: \$454,400, busiest day is Thursday 5 pm, hosted 298 training sessions, 12 firefighter injuries, 6 civilian injuries, 0 casualties, conducted 160 inspections, 37 commercial inspections, 2 fire drills, 7 Public Education projects, installed 179 smoke detectors, 3 fire prevention permits.

Goals: restructure the Department - Civil service meeting on Thursday, new Records Management system begins on August 1st - some data didn't convert.

Community Survey rating from 4 to 3, need to enhance community and Fire Risk strategies.

Goals from 2016: Radio Communication Project 100% complete, FEMA Grant awarded - cost share 30,000.

Mr. Simonson presented earlier in the meeting.

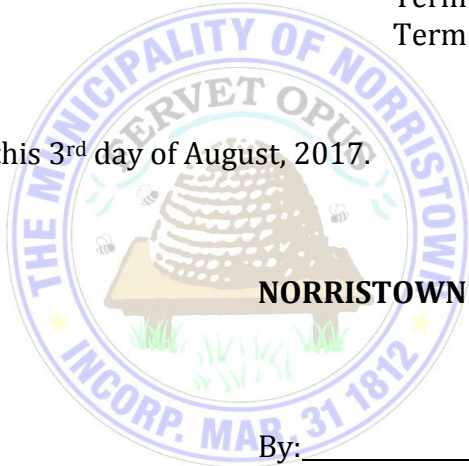

A RESOLUTION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF NORRISTOWN, MONTGOMERY COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, RATIFYING 2010 TRASH FEE RATES AND 2010-2013 ADMINISTRATIVE LIEN/PRAECIPE FEES.

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Norristown, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania (the "Municipality") has enacted the Administrative Code of the Municipality of Norristown, which contains rates or charges for services provided by the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, Section 274-76 of the Administrative Code provides for an annual trash fee to be established by Resolution by the Norristown Municipal Council;

WHEREAS, the Norristown Municipal Council adopts a Resolution establishing a schedule of fees for each year for services provided by the Municipality;

WHEREAS, in order to clarify the provision of prior resolutions, the Municipality desires to adopt this resolution ratifying and confirming the rates of the 2010 trash fee and administrative lien/praeceipe fee for the years 2010-2013;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Municipal Council of the Municipality of Norristown and hereby ENACTED as follows:

2010 Trash Fee Rates are confirmed and ratified as follows:

Single Family Dwelling	\$150
Duplex	\$300
Triplex	\$450
Quadraplex	\$600

Rooming House-Per Room Fee	\$150
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Administrative Lien/Praecepte Fees are confirmed and ratified as follows:

2010-2012 Administrative Lien/Praecepte Fee	\$ 45
2013 Administrative Lien/Praecepte Fee	\$100

ORDINANCE NO. 09-24 of 2009

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF NORRISTOWN, MONTGOMERY COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA AMENDING THE ADMINISTRATIVE CODE OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF NORRISTOWN TO IMPOSE A CHARGE ON THE OWNERS OF ALL SINGLE-FAMILY DWELLINGS, ALL MULTI-FAMILY DWELLINGS IMPROVED WITH FOUR (4) OF LESS DWELLING UNITS, AND ALL ROOMING HOUSES FOR THE COLLECTION AND TRANSPORTATION OF TRASH, RUBBISH, REFUSE, RECYCLABLE MATERIALS AND YARD WASTE; PROVIDING EXEMPTIONS FROM THE CHARGE; PROVIDING FOR COLLECTION OF THE CHARGE AND A PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO PAY THE CHARGE; REPEALING ALL INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the Municipal Council of the Municipality of Norristown, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, has enacted the Administrative Code of the Municipality of Norristown, which contains, *inter alia*, rates or charges for services supplied by the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, Section 41.4-401.A.11 of the Municipal Charter of the Municipality of Norristown authorizes the Municipal Council to enact ordinances which, *inter alia*, establish charges for services provided by the Municipality; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality provides a service of collection and transportation of trash, rubbish, refuse, recyclable materials and yard waste to the owners of certain residential property in Norristown; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Council desires to impose a charge on owners of all single-family dwellings, all multi-family dwellings improved with four (4) or less dwelling units, and all rooming houses for the collection and transportation of trash, rubbish, refuse, recyclable materials and yard waste;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it, and it is hereby **ORDAINED** by the Municipal Council of the Municipality of Norristown, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, and it is hereby **ENACTED** and **ORDAINED** by authority of same as follows:

I. Chapter 274 of the Administrative Code of the Municipality of Norristown is amended to add a new Article IX as follows:

ARTICLE IX

CHARGE FOR COLLECTION AND TRANSPORTATION OF TRASH, RUBBISH, REFUSE, RECYCLABLE MATERIALS AND YARD WASTE

Section 274-75. Definitions.

The following terms that appear in this Article IX shall have the following meanings for purposes of this Article IX only:

“DWELLING”, “DWELLING UNIT”, “SINGLE-FAMILY DWELLING UNIT”, “MULTI-FAMILY DWELLING UNIT”, and “ROOMING HOUSE” shall have the definitions ascribed to them in Chapter 320, “Zoning”, of the Administrative Code.

Section 274-76. Trash Collection and Transportation Charge Imposed.

An annual charge, to be established by the Norristown Municipal Council by Resolution, and which may be amended from time to time by Resolution of Council, shall be levied against the owner(s) of all single-family dwelling units, the owner(s) of all multi-family dwelling units improved with four (4) or less dwelling units, and the owner(s) of all rooming houses, for the collection and transportation of trash, rubbish, refuse, recyclable materials and yard waste as provided by the Municipality of Norristown. The charge on rooming houses is a per-room charge and is applicable to each room within a rooming house

Section 274-77. Exemptions.

The charge levied in Section 274-76 shall not apply to commercial and industrial establishments and/or properties improved with more than four (4) multi-family dwelling units where waste collection and transportation services are not provided by the Municipality of Norristown.

Section 274-78. Collection of Charge; Penalty.

The annual charge levied by Section 274-76 shall be set forth on the annual real estate tax bill and collected by the Municipality’s tax collector. If the charge is paid on or before sixty (60) days after the date of the tax bill, the charge shall be discounted by two percent (2%). If the charge is paid after one hundred twenty (120) days after the date of the tax bill, a ten percent (10%) penalty shall be added to the charge. If the charge is not paid by December 31 of each year, the Municipality may place a lien upon the real property for which the charge is due.

II. All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of the inconsistency.

III. The provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable. If any provision of this Ordinance is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such determination shall have no effect on the remaining provisions of this Ordinance or on the provisions of the Administrative Code of the Municipality of Norristown.

IV. This Ordinance shall be effective as provided by the Norristown Charter.



Notice: 2010 Trash Collection Fee

Dear Taxpayer:

The enclosed 2010 Real Estate Tax Bill includes the Municipal Trash Collection Fee as enacted by the Municipality of Norristown Ordinance No. 09-24 of 2009. The charge is imposed on the owners of all single-family dwellings, all multi-family dwellings improved with four (4) or less dwelling units, and all rooming houses for the collection, and transportation of trash, rubbish, refuse, recyclable materials and yard waste. Land use codes are obtained from Montgomery County records.

Rates are established as follows:

Single Family Dwelling	\$ 150
Duplex	\$ 300
Triplex	\$ 450
Quadraplex	\$ 600
 Rooming Houses-"Per Room Fee"	 \$ 150

An appeal form on the trash collection fee may be printed from the Municipality of Norristown's website @ www.norristown.org or can be obtained at the Municipal Hall Finance Department. You must submit your appeal by April 1, 2010. If your appeal is postmarked later than this date, your appeal will be denied. If your appeal is not approved by the April 1, 2010 discount deadline and you wish to receive the discount, pay the real estate tax bill with all fees in full by April 1, 2010. If your appeal is accepted, a refund will be mailed promptly. Property vacancy is not grounds for appeal.

Partial payments of real estate taxes and fees are not accepted and will be returned.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF NORRISTOWN, MONTGOMERY COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, ESTABLISHING HANDICAPPED AND LOADING ZONE PARKING SPACES IN THE MUNICIPALITY OF NORRISTOWN; PROVIDING FOR THE ERECTION OF ALL APPROPRIATE OFFICIAL TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNS AND NOTICES; PROVIDING THAT THE NORRISTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT AND ITS DESIGNEES SHALL ENFORCE THE PROVISIONS OF THIS RESOLUTION; REPEALING ALL INCONSISTENT RESOLUTIONS; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Norristown has adopted Chapter 305 of the General Laws of the Municipality of Norristown which governs vehicles and traffic within the Municipality of Norristown; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 305 of the General Laws of Norristown states that handicapped and loading zone parking spaces shall be established or eliminated by Resolution of Municipal Council, and may be amended from time to time by authority of same; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Norristown desires to establish or eliminate handicapped and loading zone parking spaces that shall remain in effect until amended by Resolution of Municipal Council;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it, and it is hereby **RESOLVED** by the Norristown Municipal Council, and it is hereby **ADOPTED** and **RESOLVED** by authority of same as follows:

I. Handicapped and loading zone parking spaces are hereby established or eliminated in the Municipality of Norristown as set forth on Exhibit "A" which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as if set forth herein at length.

II. The appropriate official traffic control signs and notices designating the handicapped and loading zone parking spaces established herein are hereby authorized to be erected or removed.

III. The Norristown Police Department and its designees are hereby authorized to enforce the provisions of Chapter 305 of the General Laws of the Municipality of Norristown, including enforcement of the handicapped and loading zone parking spaces established or eliminated by this Resolution.

IV. All provisions of other Resolutions or parts thereof inconsistent with the terms of this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of the inconsistency.

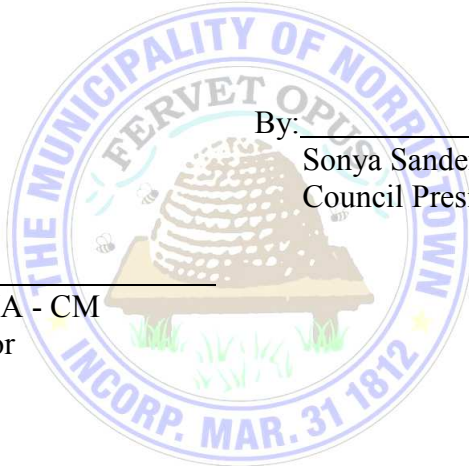

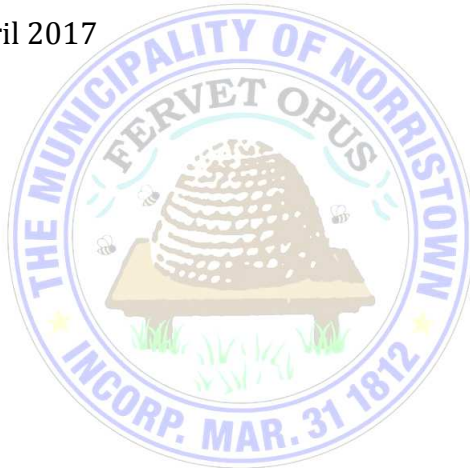
